- What is your current professional role?

- 3.) What is your current research involvement?
 Given my residency demands, my current research involvement is limited. I do hope that as residency progresses, I will be able to become more involved in research.
- 4.) What does a typical work day look like for you-including before and after work?

I typically will sleep right up to the point of having to leave my house for work. My workday is dictated by my current rotation, all which have been in the acute care setting. After returning home I will typically try to go for a walk in my neighborhood before dinner.

The learning curve in residency can be overwhelming but it can also be very rewarding.

MONA PAPER OF THE MONTH

<u>The problem:</u> Selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRI)s are commonly prescribed to pregnant women and a neurobehavioral syndrome consisting of respiratory distress, feeding difficulties, abnormal neonatal tone, and neurological abnormalities has been describes in neonates with intrauterine exposure to SSRIs. However, there has been insufficient study describing the severity of this syndrome and the requirements for respiratory support or NICU admission which affected neonates experience.

The Study: In this retrospective cohort study, Ulbrich et al study the association between intrauterine third trimester SSRI exposure and neonatal requirements for respiratory support as indicated by the standardized Neonatal Resuscitation Program (NRP). Secondary outcomes measures included: 1 and 5-minute Apgar score, birthweight, level respiratory support administered (supplemental oxygen administration, mask ventilation, and intubation), as well as NICU admission and hospital stay length. The data was collected via automated extraction of information directly from patient electronic health records from 5,696 mothers who delivered over a 6-month period in 2017-2018 in an urban tertiary care center in Chicago, Illinois. Documented prescribing of fluoxetine, sertraline, citalopram, escitalopram, fluvoxamine, or paroxetine in the third trimester were included in the exposure group. Premature deliveries, multiple gestation pregnancies and neonates with major congenital anomalies were excluded. Information including demographics, gestational age at delivery, maternal smoking status, and benzodiazepine exposure were also collected and utilized to develop covariate-adjusted odd ratios.

The Findings:

Of the 5696 women who delivered during the 6 months under study, 4933 were included in analysis. 163 (3%) women had documented SSRI exposure in the third trimester. Full term neonates who were exposed to intrauterine SSRIs in the third trimester required respiratory support 12.9% of the time compared to 4.2% to those without documented exposure confiding a covariate-adjusted OR 4.04. Evaluation also demonstrated an increase in the rate of exposed neonates having 1- and 5-minute Apgars below 5 (Covariate adjusted OR 2.75 and 5.29 respectively). Exposed neonates were also more likely to be admitted to the NICU (12.3% vs 4.2%, Covariate Adjusted OR 2.19). Of the neonates that did require respiratory support those that had been exposed to SSRIs were more likely receive supplemental oxygen, less likely to require mask ventilation, and less likely to require intubation for ventilation when compared to unexposed neonates. No meaningful difference was found in birthweight or baby length of stay.

Comments:

The results of this study continue to add to the evidence base regarding the neurobehavioral syndrome often called neonatal adaptation syndrome. Consistent with prior studies, there appears to a statistically and clinically significant increased risk for neonates exposed to SSRIs in the third trimester to require respiratory assistance in the immediate postpartum period. This study provides meaningful information regarding what this may mean in the form of increase need for supplemental oxygenation and NICU admission while at the same time also providing some reassuring results in the form of finding no meaningful difference in birthweight or length of admission when compared to non-exposed neonates. This in addition to findings of decreased need for mask ventilation or intubation lend credence the seemingly transient nature of this syndrome. While this study does review some of

the proposed mechanisms for this increased need for respiratory support, it does not provide any novel information in this area. Like many retrospective studies it suffers from some limitation in the data that is collected and evaluated including being unable to determine the indication for SSRI, SSRI dosage, or disease severity.

This study concludes by proposing that SSRI exposure in the third trimester should be considered as a risk factor for respiratory complication at delivery, a proposal that is meaningfully supported by the data provided and which should be heavily considered by health systems and individual providers.

DIVERSITY FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Augustana College, Rock Island, IL: Our **Diversity Fellowship** program supports a doctoral candidate or recent doctoral graduate from an underrepresented group to engage in teaching and research in a liberal arts college environment and prepare for a tenure-track position.

This fellowship is open to all disciplines and begins in August of the 2021-2022 academic year, with possible renewal for an additional year upon mutual agreement. We invite applications from graduate students who will use the fellowship to complete their dissertation or early career scholars within two years of completing their terminal degree who will use the fellowship to hone teaching skills and advance their scholarly agenda.

Applicants must be a member of a group or population that has been historically underrepresented in faculty positions at Augustana College or in higher education, or otherwise contribute to diversity. This includes, but is not limited to, racial and ethnic diversity, sex and gender, LGBTQ+ individuals, individuals with disabilities, and individuals with other diverse backgrounds.

Total compensation in the first year is \$40,000 (to be split between research support and salary, at the discretion of the fellow); the fellowship also comes with benefit eligibility and a relocation allowance. In the first year, the fellow will teach three courses, preferably, one fall semester course, one intensive J-term course, and one spring semester course.

Partner Support of African American Mothers Study

Dr. Sheehan Fisher, Assistant Professor at Northwestern's Feinberg School of Medicine, is currently recruiting African-American mothers with prenatal depression and their partners for an NIMHD-funded RCT. Fathers are an underutilized resource to reduce the mother's environmental stress and assist in treating their depression. The African-American Social Support Effectiveness Treatment-Partners alleviating Perinatal Depression (ASSET-PPD) protocol targets the fathers' family engagement and support of the mothers' mental health treatment to reduce maternal stress. Therefore, the study requires minimal involvement of the mothers.

Inclusion criteria:

- · Pregnant African-American mothers with male partners over the age of 18
- · Parents need to be living together
- · Availability to enroll in study during the 2nd trimester
- · Mothers must be in treatment for depression with current symptoms
